



A delightful cottage in a rural setting, Ailsa View is an attractively restored semi-detached cottage, with a spectacular view of Ailsa Craig and the Firth of Clyde. It is one of four dwellings at Torr Nan Uain, a gated farm steading, located at the south end of the Isle of Arran at Shannochie, outside Kilmory. The cottage is located at the end of a 500 metre farm track which is suitable for all cars.

The Cottage

The property offers generous accommodation, furnished and equipped to a very high standard. The interior complements the peaceful location of the cottage which provides the perfect setting for a relaxing stay.

Upstairs

2 Spacious bedrooms, one twin and one double, each with en-suite shower.
Freeview television in double bedroom.
Ample cupboard and wardrobe space in upstairs hall.
Linen and towels provided.
Travel cot and stairgate available.

Downstairs

Large lounge with electric stove, freeview TV, DVD/CD player and Docking Station.
Adjoining sun lounge with access to garden.
Bathroom with additional shower.
Utility room with washer/dryer.
Fully equipped dining kitchen with fridge, freezer, dishwasher, microwave, electric oven/hob.

The cottage has electric central heating and is WiFi enabled.

Tariff

Isle of Arran

The cottage is ideally situated to observe a variety of Arran wildlife and birds of prey.

A 15 minute walk from the cottage leads to a secluded beach, which is part of the Arran Coastal Path.

The Isle of Arran, is one of the most southerly Scottish islands and sits in the Firth of Clyde between Ayrshire and Kintyre. Arran is 19 miles long by 10 miles wide and has a remarkable diversity of landscapes and seascapes and is known as 'Scotland in Miniature'. The pretty villages on Arran's beautiful coastline are complemented by a rugged and mountainous interior in the north and green rolling hills and woodland in the south.

The island is a haven for outdoor pursuits ranging from 7 golf courses, hill and coastal walking, mountain biking, cycling, bird watching, beachcombing and horse riding . If you prefer indoor relaxation and pampering the Auchrannie Hotel in Brodick and the Kinloch Hotel in Blackwaterfoot provide swimming pools and spa facilities. The island is also well served with restaurants, bistros and coffee shops. In addition there are many craft shops and the island is home to the world famous Arran Aromatics and Arran Cheese.

Getting to Isle of Arran

The main access route is Ardrossan to Brodick, which has a connecting rail service from Glasgow. There is also a summer car ferry link from Cloanaig on Kintyre to Lochranza.
